FINANCIAL SUMMARY YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2019

Little Flower Parish remains in good financial condition thanks in large part to your ongoing generosity; however, we are experiencing a downward trend that is concerning.

Sunday contributions for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019 were approximately \$13,000 under budget. Since that time, we have continued to experience a steady decline in Sunday collections, and we are currently showing a significant deficit of over \$20,000. Prior to Fr. Bob's request for deficit-reduction gifts, we reached a deficit of \$29,339. Although we received a little over \$7,600 in gifts to help reduce the deficit, the gap continues to widen each week. This deficit is a top concern at this point as Sunday collections pay for our day-to-day operating expenses, including salaries.

2019 Accomplishments

STEWARDSHIP COMMISSION

<u>Stewardship</u>

- Conducted a successful Summer Festival with profits exceeding \$65,000.
- Introduced a new three-part format for the annual Stewardship drive. The parish will focus on each aspect of stewardship individually and at different times of the year.

Finances

Total income exceeded total expenses for the fiscal year.

Facilities

- New windows were installed on both floors of the parish center.
- All tables and chairs in Duffey Hall have been replaced with new ones.
- Installed security cameras on the interior and exterior of the school building.
- Installed new drinking fountains with bottle fill in the school building.
- Plans are underway for a handicap accessibility project in the parish center.

LITURGY COMMISSION

- Coordinated consensus on Mass schedule change implemented on December 1, 2019.
- Maintained average weekend Mass attendance after Mass schedule change.

PARISH LIFE COMMISSION

- New parishioners were sent a Welcome Packet shortly after registering in the parish.
- Volunteers with our Funeral Luncheon Committee hosted "Mercy Meals" for several families following the death of a loved one.
- ♦ In addition to the usual events Parish Picnic, Halloween Party, Christmas Party, Advent Night, First Communion Luncheon, and Soup Supper the Parish Life Commission sponsored a special Advent Project: they handed out bags containing cake mixes, icing, balloons, and candles to families with children along with the suggestion that each family make a birthday cake for Jesus as a means of focusing on the true meaning of Christmas.
- Though the Christopher Ministry, homebound parishioners received Communion throughout the year and cards were sent weekly to a homebound parishioner.
- In conjunction with Little Flower's Health Ministry, we hosted 2 blood drives and offered blood pressure checks once a month. Grief books were sent to those in the parish that suffered a loss.
- The Gabriel Project assisted mothers with material goods such as diapers, wipes, and baby clothes.
- Through the generosity of parishioners, our St. Vincent de Paul Society helped families at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Over 200 home visits were made to assess needs of clients. Many families were assisted with paying utilities, received gas cards or household appliances, and/or were assisted with rent money. Bags of food were given as needed throughout the year.
- Through their fundraising efforts, the Ladies Club presented a check to Fr. Bob to help with parish expenses in addition to collecting money for flowers for Easter, Christmas, and our Novena. Members donated socks stuffed with soap, shampoo, toothbrush and toothpaste for the homeless and made goodie bags to hand out to those begging on the street. Members of the Ladies Club provided desserts for the fish fry and donated to the silent auction for our festival. They had several social outings and went Christmas caroling at several nursing homes.
- The Men's Club hosted our weekly Lenten Fish Fry and the Mother's Day Breakfast. They worked hard this past year keeping our grounds in order. Each month there was a work day to complete various projects throughout our campus. They enjoyed a number of social outings and offered tailgating at several sporting events.
- Coffee and Donuts were offered after the 8:30 a.m. Mass on most weekends under the leadership of Mandie Wade, Shannon Estrada, and Mike Haigerty.
- The 8th grade class hosted a Senior Prom for our parishioners and the Adventuresome Group met monthly for lunch and some type of program, often involving students from the school. One month the meeting was open to all of our cohort parishes.

INVITE COMMISSION

- Hosted another round of Christ Life series.
- Began offering bible studies with various concentrations.
- Sponsored a contest for Little Flower School children to write an essay describing what they would do if Jesus came to their house for dinner. Four lucky winners were treated to a Colts game and even got to meet some of the players, who talked to them about their faith journeys.

LITTLE FLOWER CATHOLIC SCHOOL AND THE SCHOOL COMMISSION:

- Applied for and received Safe and Secure Schools Grant from the Department of Homeland Security to install new and safer classroom doors.
- Revised school strategic plan.
- Students scored 110 on a scale of 100 for growth on the new ILEARN test.
- Mrs. Meghan Reasner was Little Flower's nominee for the St. Theodora Guerin Excellence in Education Award.
- Students participated (and continue to participate) in Little Way Families to promote community and community values.
- Began implementation of Conscious Discipline program.
- The full staff participated in a literacy retreat, trauma-informed classroom training, and staff retreats.
- Enjoyed a dance presentation for the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

2020 Challenges

- Increased needs for English language learners, trauma, and special education in the school.
- School enrollment is no longer growing, but remaining steady.
- Need for increased overall volunteerism. In some areas, volunteer commitment appears to be waning due to individuals' multiple priorities and willingness to commit.
- To increase Sunday giving so as to meet our Sunday Collection budget.
- To address facility maintenance challenges, including getting a cooling system for the rectory and removing asbestos in the parish center and school buildings.
- Less than one-third of registered parishioners attend weekend liturgy.
- Due to aging clergy, we will continue to face changes. Parish vitality will be paramount to maintaining identity.
- Adult faith formation and volunteer formation will be increasingly important as parish staffing changes occur.
- Some people, especially young people, are turning away from the church amid scandal and controversy.
- To continue to find funding to support all of the needs of our parishioners and those within our parish boundaries.
- To continue to provide new social opportunities for parishioners.
- To find ways to get more families to participate in celebrations.
