

#### SILENT AUCTION CHANGES – NEW MOBILE PLATFORM

Exciting changes are afoot for this year's Silent Auction at Summerfest! After serious consideration over the past couple of years, we have decided to move the Silent Auction bidding to a mobile platform. Simply stated, this means that you will use your mobile device (or tablet or computer) to place your bids instead of writing them on paper bid sheets. Parishioners, alumni, and friends from all over the country can participate in our Silent Auction! All you must do is visit the website below to register as a bidder anytime from now until the end of the auction on June 6, 2021, the last day of the festival.

There are several benefits to the new platform worth noting:

- Mobile bidding allows bidders to bid from wherever they are—on church grounds, at home, anywhere!
- Mobile bidding will send alerts to bidders' devices when they have been outbid. Bidders can then place a new bid from wherever they are.
- You can set automatic maximum bids on the items you want to try hardest to secure. The system will automatically keep raising your bid to the amount you set.
- Convenience Mobile bidding makes it convenient to participate and bid on auction items throughout the entire
- No app download is necessary. Registration is as easy as providing your name, email, and mobile number.
- Bidders may pay on website with a credit card or choose to pay cash/check/credit at time of pick-up as usual.
- We will NOT require bidders' credit card information to make bids.
- Bidders can monitor bids anytime without having to go to the location of the item.
- Items can be viewed before the event. Bidders can come prepared and ready to bid on the items they want to take home.
- There will be volunteers on hand at the silent auction to assist and make bids for people who do not have smart phones. The volunteers can also assist bidders with bidding on their own devices.
- Winners will be texted immediately upon closing the auction with information about what they won and how much to pay. No more waiting in line at the end of the auction to see if you won something.

We are hopeful that the new bidding platform will increase revenue by increasing the volume of bids and the number of people who can participate. In light of that, our auction will only be as good as the items we can put in it. So please consider whether you have anything that you could donate for the auction. It could be as simple as an unused gift card you have laying around or a timeshare you will not have a chance to use this year, or perhaps you are a skilled artisan and want to donate a one-of-a-kind piece. # Parishioner Andrew Clegg Writes First Book!

Editor's Note: Andrew Clegg graduated from Little Flower Grade School and Scecina High School and is in his final year at Hanover College. He published his first novel, The Lost Child, in 2020.

<u>LFGN</u>: What motivated you to write your book?

Andrew: I can't say there's really one thing in particular that motivated me to write a book. I always loved writing stories growing up. I wrote several in my sixth grade language arts class at Little Flower, and it was just something I felt I had a talent for. Perhaps the two things that I can credit most to me starting this process when I did were that I was starting to get back into reading for fun again and I enrolled myself in a creative writing workshop at Hanover. These two things happening at the same time were sort of the 'perfect storm' to get me started on my first attempt at a novel.

LFGN: What was the writing process like?

AC: The process proved to be even more difficult than I had expected. I came up with a premise one night and immediately started writing, but I very quickly learned that you can have the most creative premise in the world and it means nothing



without a good plot. I ended up actually writing about a hundred pages of a story about kids in a prison trying to figure out what they had been put there for and break out, only to realize I didn't have much of an idea where it was going. I had to scrap about 70% of it and come up with a new story using the same characters. The process of world building is very long and tedious. On top of developing characters and a plot, I had to come up with specifics of the time period, technology, government system, social hierarchy, geography, religion, language, history, culture, and rules for the magic system that my book would use. At times it could be very overwhelming trying to make all of these different aspects line up in a way that makes sense, but was also one of the most exciting parts of writing in my opinion. Most of the world-building came purely from imagination or influence from other books, movies, or games I've experienced. I did some research about real world cultures, technologies of different time periods, and even mythology. I wanted to tie in enough of these details to make a setting that felt both magical and real enough to be convincing.

LFGN: Anything in your Little Flower or Scecina backgrounds that inspired your writing?

AC: As I said before, my love of writing really began in my sixth grade class at Little Flower. Mrs. Suer (who was Ms. Mitchell at the time) had us reading and writing every single day, and it quickly became my favorite part of school. I became known for writing a series of stories that I called *The Unicorn Hunters*, and I was always heavily encouraged by my classmates to share them. I can't say the stories I wrote back then were really all that good, but I guess they were entertaining to a bunch of twelve-year-olds. Mrs. Suer was also very motivational to me, and always gave me great feedback to my writing. Even in college as I was working on The Lost Child, I would think about what she would say when she read it.

LFGN: How has this book changed your life?

AC: I'd say the biggest way this book changed my life is that it's made me want to pursue being an author as a career. Before, writing was just something I was doing on the side for fun. I'll definitely continue to do it for my own enjoyment no matter what happens, but I would love to make it my full time job one day. Writing this story also changed my life in little ways. I'm so attached to these characters I've written, it almost feels like they're real people now. In working on the sequel, there have been times where I've had to step away and take a break, because I'm so emotionally drained by some of the things I have to write. It sounds really corny, but the story doesn't even feel like it belongs to me anymore. It's Oliver, Liviah, and Ridley's story, and I'm just the one who gets to tell it. It gives me a sense of peace and wonder to feel like these characters have lives outside of what I've written for them. It's truly surreal knowing that I've I had the opportunity to create an entire world from the ground up.

LFGN: What do you hope to accomplish going forward?

AC: My goals for the future are pretty simple – I'd like to produce sequels to *The Lost Child* that each improve upon the last, both in writing proficiency and entertainment value. If I can continue to sell copies of my book and grow my audience with each new release, I'd consider myself successful. I was very excited to get my book into Irvington Vinyl and Books and I would love to see it on the shelves of many other stores. My "reach for the stars" dream, as I call it, would be to one day see this story turned into a film and get to work on the production of it. I love The Lost Child as a book, obviously - that's why I wrote it as a novel and not as a screenplay - but there's something about the idea of seeing it come to life in a movie that I think would be extremely gratifying.

#### Little Flower Connects with IU Health

In the fall of 2020 and amid the raging COVID-19 pandemic, Little Flower Parish teamed up with IU Health to become a part of the everexpanding IU Health Congregation Partnership. The purpose of the program is to pair someone recently discharged from an IU Health healthcare setting with a member of a congregation or group, in this case a specially trained member of Little Flower.

Volunteer members of Little Flower underwent training as companions to learn the five practices of companionship and to be able to connect patients with a network of community resources. The volunteers have become aware of how to address issues of social isolation and loneliness, especially for persons with chronic illnesses. The idea is that the person in need of companionship is able to share with the volunteer their concerns and needs as they recover from their healthcare experience.

#### Companionship: History & Roots

- The Model of Companionship developed as a way to engage with individuals who were experiencing homelessness and mental illness.
- · Companionship is rooted in the caring practices of spiritual community, going back to the most ancient of faith traditions.
- · Companionship is a principled, practical response to the suffering and struggle of our neighbors



Every week or so for a minimum of six weeks, the Little Flower companion connects with the person in the hopes of lending an ear to reassure the contact that someone is there for them. For example, the volunteer and the person might share their interests in family, cooking or sports. As it happened, one LF volunteer was able to assist his contact with a car repair and the installation of a handrail for the contact's porch steps. Although the communication and sharing would be best experienced in a face-to-face environment, COVID has relegated most interactions to phone or internet. However, a fully vaccinated LF volunteer was able to take a vaccinated companion to church at St. Monica's which has also implemented this program. Ideally, safe, in-person interaction will become the preferred model as more people are vaccinated.

In addition to supporting the Little Flower team, IU Health provides Little Flower Parish with a monthly financial stipend to help defray the parish's monetary participation in the program. This money has already been used to assist with things like the aforementioned car repair and for recipient grocery gift cards at Christmas.

# **Scecina Coach Reaches 800 Wins**



#### LITURGY & MUSIC MINISTRY DURING A PANDEMIC



March 15, 2020 – that was the last time our adult choir sang at a Sunday Mass, and the day that so many things began to change.

The next few months found us celebrating Liturgy in an almost empty church, including our celebration of Holy Week and Easter Liturgies. Almost immediately, we developed a virtual congregation. It was a blessing to be able to bring Mass to people in this way, and we even attracted some non-parishioners to celebrate with us, but something was definitely missing.

June 2020 brought the return of limited numbers to church. Great care was taken to make every effort to insure a safe environment. Numbers were low our first weekend back (115 people total that first weekend), but attendance has slowly increased since that time. Christmas and Easter brought processes for ticketing and reservations to be sure we did not exceed a safe number of attendees. Paper weekly worship aids have been generated each week since we could not use hymnals. As of this writing, it appears that our attendance has grown to about 50% of pre-pandemic levels.

Throughout this time, it's become very obvious that liturgy needs a vibrant, participating congregation to be celebrated well. We can't wait to welcome more people back to that active celebration of weekend Eucharist.

We owe a debt of gratitude of our parishioners who stepped up to serve as hospitality ministers during this time, and to all our Liturgical Ministers who have continued to serve.

With everything we have tried to do, there is still a void in our weekend liturgies where our adult choir and youth choir were previously. Our cantor and instrumentalists have done a wonderful job in providing music for our weekend Christmas and Easter marked the safe return of small groups from our choir, who created a sense of celebration and some level of normalcy. We long for the day that we can welcome full choirs back to church.

When it is safe to do so, there will be some rebuilding to do in music ministry. We hope that all of our previous youth and adult choir members will be ready to return. However, we always need more youth choir members (grades 8 through 12), and that will be even more important as some of our members will be leaving for college in the fall. Our adult choir was already in desperate need of some new members, particularly men. It's not too early to think about how you can help in this effort. Be thinking now about whether God is calling you to help in this effort. Perhaps you will consider joining the adult or youth choir, or perhaps you can encourage youth members of your household to join the youth choir. Coming back after such a long absence won't be easy, and we won't be able to do it without adding some people to our ranks.

Most of all, let's pray for the return of a full and vibrant congregation to church as soon as people feel safe to come back.

### An Introduction

Editor's Note: This open letter from parishioner Dick Kramer is the first in a series of personal thoughts about contemporary Catholic prayer. His goal is to elicit comments, advice and criticisms about how the words with which we pray impact our faith. Dick has provided his contact information at the bottom of this article if you would like to reply to him. The viewpoints expressed here are his alone.



Dear Fellow Parishioners of Little Flower,

Gardens are small or large plots in which edible and flowers are planted. They are tended to, cultivated, weeded, nourished and watered. The human mind is similar. It is cultivated while learning the new, weeded by letting go of mistakes made, nourished with information and watered with an open mind to the views of others. A garden is challenged to flourish and produce a bounty against invaders, insects and weather. The mind is also challenged to exercise reason; show civility to others; maintain non-judgmental attitudes; love neighbors as much as self; and to express productive thinking while sharing, at risk, one's conclusions that have incorporated all positive and negative feedback.

Through a series of entries in *The Little Flower Garden*, I freely place myself at risk. I want to address suggestions to be made to common prayers and other minimal thoughts, seeking feedback from my parish family. Together we can share our thoughts about how we pray and how prayer can become more meaningful to us.

Since as early as 1995, I have written, rewritten, edited and re-edited common prayers many times. After sharing the completed wording with local individuals and receiving no responses, I sent the entire collection to the International Commission for English in the Liturgy (I.C.E.L.) in December 2017. Communications by phone and letters with I.C.E.L. have proved to be productive.

The product of my reasonings is rooted in the soil of my beliefs that influenced my thinking. These six roots are as follows:

One: We have led ourselves to believe we know God (all of everything), but God's Son, Jesus Christ, proclaimed, "Only I know the Father and the Father knows Me." Additionally, "The Father does not think as humans do."

Two: All we think we know about God is ultimately a complete mystery. No one knows the Father, or will, except through our belief that Jesus Christ is the Son of God made man on earth (without sin?).

Three: Faith in the Son of God is a gift from God and is to be nourished through prayer, meditation and listening; and to be fully aware of what we are saying.

Four: Common prayers are often verbalized repeatedly by rote without listening to each word we are saying or being profoundly aware of their meaning or the mystery within.

Five: We do not, in my opinion, state often enough or acknowledge that God is miraculous and mysterious.

Six: The very lengthy process of rewriting words in prayers or scripture is ongoing and will take years. How many changes have you experienced throughout your lifetime? For example, during the consecration of the wine the celebrant now says "in a similar way" and no longer "in a like manner." To me, the prior says "kinda like" while the latter savs "same."

Therefore, being that we are all prophets, I hope to be allowed to continue offering my views/thinking, one prayer at a time. My goal is to elicit comments, advice, criticism or whatever in regards to what has been presented here as a seed that may have fallen on good ground.
