THE CHURCH AS COMMUNITY

My Brothers and Sisters,

In today's Gospel [18th Sunday in Ordinary Time], Jesus begins his Eucharistic Discourse.

Little Flower, together with most Catholic parishes and other Christian churches, is struggling to recov-



er from the pandemic. Almost every week our numbers at Sunday Eucharist are increasing. Currently we are at approximately two-thirds of pre-pandemic attendance. Thank you for having returned home to Little Flower. In the coming weeks, we will attempt outreaches to encourage those who are able to return to Sunday Mass.

One of our challenges is that many people are finding it hard to return to Mass simply because they got out of the habit of attending Mass. Others are finding it hard to attend every Sunday because again they are out of the habit of attending every Sunday. Other have found it easier to watch the streamed Mass either live or at their convenience. Still others do not feel safe returning.

However, churches have an even bigger challenge than encouraging their parishioners to return to Mass. Even pre-Covid, attendance at Mass here and in many, if not most, parishes hovered around one-third of registered members. Today many Christians and Catholics believe they can be good Catholics or good Christians without attending church because they believe in Jesus, pray, and try to live good lives. Many of them and others would answer they are spiritual but not religious.

If we look at the New Testament, however, the Christianity of Jesus is a Christianity of church or community. In the Gospels, Jesus first built a community of disciples and then established a church built on the foundation of the apostles. His teaching was constantly bringing people together. Acts of the Apostles is primarily the story of the foundations of the first Christian communities around the Roman Empire. Most of Paul's Letters were written not to individuals but to church communities.

What does it mean to be church? An American Catholic Catechism attempted to define the Church: "The Church is the community of those called to acknowledge the Lordship of Jesus, who ratify that faith sacramentally, and who commit themselves to membership and mission for the sake of the Kingdom of God in history." The Church is, first of all, a community, a flesh and blood community, called by God. This community, established by Christ, is called to faith, sacraments, and service.

In other words, we are called to live and share faith within a faith community. In fact, the New Testament frequently urges us to support one another in faith.

When we are actively part of a parish or faith community, we have the benefit of having others to support us both in our faith struggles and our everyday life struggles. Likewise, being actively part of a faith community adds a layer of accountability to our choices. Finally, it is easier to live a faith-filled and faithful Christian life just being together with individuals who share our faith and our values.

My brothers and sisters, in today's Gospel, Jesus said, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." Although John 6 is often referred to as Jesus' Eucharistic Discourse, it might better be termed Jesus' Bread of Life Discourse because only part of the discourse focuses on the Eucharist. In this passage, Jesus proclaims that he himself is the bread of life. As he said, those who come to him will never hunger, and those who believe in him will never thirst. Where do we find Jesus? Jesus promised always to be present in the community of the Church: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them'" [Mt. 18:20].



The RCIA is a communal process which will touch on almost everything about the Catholic Church and answer the questions of potential candidates or catechumens as they move toward the final rite, usually at the Easter Vigil, when they will become full members of the Roman Catholic Church. A requirement for First Eucharist is to be a baptized Catholic. If your son or daughter has not been baptized in the Catholic Faith, please contact the parish center for more information. Generally speaking, at least one parent of a child being presented for Baptism must be Catholic.

So, as you can see, a lot of fun opportunities for the men of Little Flower! We would love to have you join our Club! Yours in Christ.





ANNUAL DAVID O'CONNOR AND ALL VETERANS MEMORIAL MASS

The 10th annual David O'Connor and All Veterans Memorial Mass was celebrated by Fr. Bob at 5:00 p.m. on July 31st. David was a 1962 graduate of Little Flower School, a year older than Fr. Bob who graduated in 1963. The usual celebration of life continued at The Irish Mutt with a short presentation by a Vet.

Sergeant O'Connor received numerous medals, including The Bronze Star and <u>four</u> Purple Hearts. Even though the rules of service guaranteed a soldier could go home after <u>three</u> Purple Hearts, Sgt O'Connor wanted to stay to protect his platoon. David was killed in action (KIA) on August 2, 1969. Three bricks honoring David's ultimate sacrifice, shown below, are at the bottom of the steps of the Soldiers and Sailors Monument in downtown Indianapolis.





Paul Hoffmann was also a '62 grad of Little Flower and a first cousin of David. Paul did extensive research with fellow soldiers of Sgt O'Connor, some of whom came from as far away as Montana and Louisiana—even though they did not know anyone at the memorial

services— to provide testimonials about how great a leader and protector David was of his men. Paul joined David in Heaven on September 14, 2020. RIP, Paul.

Here is a letter sent to David Dinn, author of this article, from Christine Wolff Taylor:

David, this is Chris (Wolff) Taylor. My dad had a rosary presented by David [O'Connor] on behalf of the Little Flower football team. He carried it with him in his pocket, quite literally, until the day he died. He had a serious surgery many years ago; as he was coming around, he asked for his wedding ring, David's rosary, and his wallet. Thank you for carrying on the Mass for David.

GABRIEL PROJECT NEEDS YOUR HELP

THE POWER OF PRAYER - THE GLORY BE

Editor's Note: This open letter from parishioner Dick Kramer is the second in a series of personal thoughts about contemporary Catholic prayer. His goal is to elicit comments, advice and criticisms about how the words with which we pray impact our faith. Greetings Fellow Parishioners of Little Flower,

In my article "An Introduction" from the May 2021 Little Flower Garden, I explained my six reasons for suggesting changes to commonly used prayers (see page one for how to access prior newsletters online). The prayer "The Glory Be" touches on several of my ideas for these changes, so I want to start with it in this second open letter.

The current version sanctioned by the church is:

Glory Be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Here is my version which I believe makes things clearer and more meaningful to me:

Glory be to the Eternal Triune God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Your world without end. Amen.

I assume most people have an understanding of The Big Bang Theory. Simply stated, some scientists believe that all of the mass of the ever-expanding universe was the result of the explosion of one central ball of mass billions of years ago. If true, into what is the universe expanding if not an eternity that lies beyond our comprehension? This is why I use the word "Eternal" in my suggested prayer. I think the use of "Triune God" addresses the mystery of our faith in three persons in one eternal God.

I believe the phrase in the current prayer "As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be..." overlooks the fact that eternity has no beginning and no end. However, there is an "is" in the form of God who has always been and always will be. Finally, concluding with "Your world without end" directly emphasizes God's world (heaven) and not our own here on Earth.

Never forget that God's Son, Jesus Christ, proclaimed: "Only I know the Father and the Father knows Me." Clearly, the Father is a mystery beyond our comprehension.
