LITTLE FLOWER PRAYER VINE - PRAYING FOR ONE ANOTHER

Prayer is an important part of each of our lives. Most of us have seen and felt the power of prayer at work in us or in others. Did you know that each of you have the opportunity to pray for others on a daily basis? You also have the opportunity to request prayers for any reason such as illness, decision making, someone in the armed services, the list is endless.

There are several ways to request prayers and to find out who is in need of prayer.

• There is a Prayer Intention book in church in the main gathering space where you may write your prayer request. This book of prayer intentions is presented with the offertory gifts at each weekend liturgy.



- Names can be submitted for prayer request in the bulletin by contacting **Peggy Clegg at pclegg@littleflowerparish.org or 317-357-8352 x106**. You may only submit your name or a family member's name. Names will be left on the prayer list in the bulletin until you request that they be removed. Please indicate if the prayer request is for someone in the military and, if so, what branch of the military.
- You may use the Little Flower Prayer Vine and you may also become a member of the "Prayer Vine." Information on how to do this is below.

The Little Flower Prayer Vine is a group of parishioners who pray for fellow parishioners or their relatives and friends in need. There are NO meetings! This is a ministry that can be done in your home, at work, in your car, whenever and wherever you pray.

Likewise, you may also request prayers for family members and friends through the Prayer Vine. It is important to obtain permission from the person for whom you wish to request prayers before adding him/her to the Prayer Vine. There are several different ways to leave prayer requests and to receive prayer requests for the Prayer Vine.

HOW TO LEAVE A PRAYER REQUEST

- 1. Call the Parish Office at 357-8352 and ask for ext 138. If you are calling after office hours, simply press 138 when the recording plays. In either case you will be transferred to a voicemail box where you can leave your prayer request. You could also give our parish secretary your prayer request if that is easier for you.
- 2. You may contact Peggy Clegg at pclegg@littleflowerparish.org or 317-357-8352 x106 to request a prayer be added to the Prayer Vine
- 3. You may use the following e-mail address, helpwithprayers@littleflowerparish.org, to send your prayer requests
- 4. You may also go to our parish website, www.littleflowerparish.org, and follow the steps below to send a prayer request and to be added to the Prayer Vine.
 - * Click on the "Prayer and Liturgy" tab
 - * Click on "Prayer Vine Form"
 - * You will be requested to give your e-mail address and prayer request. Once you have done this hit "submit." After a waiting period your prayer request will be posted on the Prayer Vine.

HOW TO RECEIVE PRAYER REQUESTS THAT HAVE BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE PRAYER VINE

- If you wish to automatically receive all prayer requests that are submitted so that you can pray for these intentions, click on the "Prayer and Liturgy" tab, then click on the "Prayer Vine Form" tab. At the very bottom of the page there is a place where you can enter your email address and subscribe to the prayer vine.
- If you wish to only view prayers that have been requested, you need to click on the "Prayer and Liturgy" tab and then click on the "Prayer Vine" tab this will take you directly to all prayers that have been recently requested.

Please don't miss out on this opportunity to help your fellow parishioners. Sometimes prayer is the only thing and the best thing that we can do for someone going through a difficult time. We should never underestimate the power of prayer.

THE POWER OF PRAYER - GLORY TO GOD

Editor's Note: This open letter from parishioner Dick Kramer is the fourth in a series of personal thoughts about contemporary Catholic prayer. His goal is to elicit comments, advice and criticisms about how the words with which we pray impact our faith. Greetings Fellow Parishioners of Little Flower,

In my article "An Introduction" from the May 2021 Little Flower Garden, I explained my six reasons for suggesting changes to commonly used prayers (see page one for how to access prior newsletters online). This quarter I offer my thoughts on the "Glory To God" recited or sung at Mass.

The Power

There are three distinctive parts to the "Glory to God." First, we praise the Father; second, we praise the Son; and, lastly and briefly, the Holy Spirit. The wording of the stanzas are not a problem but the intermittent wording of the refrain has not worked for me for many years.

I have long stopped singing "Glory to God in the highest and peace to all people of goodwill." For years I have otherwise sung quietly "Glory to God in the highest and peace to all people of the earth." I have long thought that wishing peace only to those people of "goodwill" was not inclusive of all people of the earth. It seemed to me that we only wished/prayed for peace for those people who held our beliefs and acted towards others as we are called to do. This approach may eliminate our wishes for peace to much of the world's population.

We are taught to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. In an attempt to find information about the definition of the phrase "all people of goodwill" in religious terms, I researched the Encyclical of Pope Benedict XVI signed June 29, 2009. This work, CARITAS IN VERITATE (Love or Charity in Truth), defines the meaning for me and it states:

For believers, the world derives neither from blind chance nor from strict necessity, but from God's plan. This is what gives rise to the duty of believers to unite their efforts with those of all men and women of good will, with the followers of other religions and with non-believers, so that this world of ours may effectively correspond to the divine plan: living as a family under the Creator's watchful eye.

Each of us is like a drop of water falling into a pool whereupon we become one with all, even with unwanted algae and bacteria lurking around. Jesus Christ is like the chlorine that was poured into the pool to cleanse all of us. All we have to do is carry our crosses, open our hearts and let Him in—something that is, unfortunately, easier said than done.

cloths are in two different locations which means that Jesus purposely put them in two separate locations. The fact that he is not bound by the burial cloths show us that he has passed through death and it no longer has power over him.

This should give us joy on Easter Sunday. Lent will continue to be more penitential than it might have been pre-Covid. We are still impacted by the seemingly endless pandemic. Jesus is not. He can truly raise us up out of the things we are going through. As St. Paul says, "If you were then raised with Christ, seek what is above." We can still live our faith, we can still love our families, call those who need to talk, take care of those who are in need being safe and taking precautions. We can still do these things. It is because Jesus has risen from the dead. That joy can still affect us to our soul and bring goodness of our devastation. Let us remember that Jesus took on the sin of the world in his death on the cross and peacefully rose from the dead. Let his peace be in our hearts today.
