EASTER TRADITIONS AROUND THE WORLD

Catholics know how to throw an Easter party. The Church celebrates fifty days of Easter, spanning the time between Easter Vigil and Pentecost. That's plenty of time to throw a party or two!

Looking to shake things up a bit this year? Check out these fun Easter celebrations from around the world for some inspiration!

Host an Egg Fight

You've heard of an Easter egg hunt, but how about an Easter egg fight? In Bulgaria, adults and children alike arm themselves with hard boiled eggs. They then go around tapping each other's eggs. The person whose egg doesn't crack wins the contest and is believed to have good health for the year to come.

Get Treats from the Easter Bells



French children don't believe that the Easter bunny comes to visit their home to bring treats. Instead, the treats come from the Easter bells. In France, no bells are rung between Holy Thursday and Easter Vigil. French legend holds that the bells weren't rung on those days because they grew wings and flew to Rome to be blessed by the pope. The bells returned from their flight loaded down with chocolate and gifts for the children.

Explode an Old Cart.

Fireworks aren't just for New Year's Eve. In Florence, Italians celebrate Easter with the tradition of "scoppio del carro," or "explosion of the cart." Italians load up an old cart with fireworks and pull it in front of the Duomo. Then the Archbishop of Florence lights a fuse during the Easter Mass that leads to the cart outside in the square. Spectators enjoy an Easter firework show.

Looking for another Italian tradition? Residents of Panicale, a town south of Florence, celebrate the day after Easter with a friendly competition. Town residents roll huge wheels of cheese around the perimeter of the town.

Put Together a Blessing Basket



Święconka is one of the most beloved Polish Easter traditions. On Holy Saturday, Polish families make blessing baskets. The baskets are filled to the brim with Easter foods that each contain a symbolic meaning. For instance, eggs symbolize Christ's rising from the dead, while ham reminds the Polish people of great joy and abundance.

Lent doesn't end until the priest blesses the Easter blessing baskets. In rural communities, the priest goes from home to home, blessing the baskets. But it's more common to see parishioners gather at the church for a communal blessing.

Pet an Easter Bilby

Australians consider rabbits pests because they wreck havoc on the land. So instead of visits from the Easter rabbit, Australian children are visited by the Easter Bilby. In 1991, the Foundation for Rabbit-Free Australia started a campaign to replace the bunny with the bilby. Today, Australians purchase chocolate bilbies for their Easter celebrations and the funds support bilby conservation efforts.



Dance the Morris

In the U.K., people gather for Morris dance performances. Morris dancing is a folk dance that dates back to the Middle Ages. Men show up with bells around their ankles. Everyone dances through the streets waving ribbons. Legend says the Morris dance drives out the spirits of winter and brings good luck for the year to come.

Morris dancing isn't just for the English, though. Morris sides (or teams) can be found in the United States, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Hong Kong, the Netherlands, Finland, Sweden, and Cyprus.

LITTLE FLOWER SPOTLIGHT: MEET THE DAVIS/CHEEVER FAMILY

This issue's "Little Flower Spotlight" is on the Ryan Davis/Liz Cheever Family. Thanks to Cindy Woods for conducting this interview.

Little Flower Garden News (LFGN): Tell us about your family, names and ages of children, how you met, and how long have you been members of Little Flower. Ryan Davis/Liz Cheever Family (DCF): We are a blended family. We met while we were both working at the Indiana School For The Blind And Visually Impaired. Although we had seen each other, we worked in different parts of the school and we hadn't met until we both answered an email "call out" for people interested in running the Boy Scout programs at the school. We were the only ones who showed up, so we were hired! I (Liz) took on the Cub Scouts and Ryan took on the Boy Scouts. We were fast friends!

We were very excited about developing and growing the Scouting program. We had similar ideas for providing opportunities for the boys and we were very excited to get started! We developed a strong friendship and we worked well together, which led to us working together on multiple projects around the school for years. Fast forward 8 years...I had been a single mom for 5 years and Ryan was newly single and we decided to see if our friendship could evolve into something more and it did! We married in 2017.

Between us we have nine children. I had four biological children and an adopted

daughter and Ryan had four biological children. So in age order: Mercades is 20, Dean is 16, Rain, Frank, and Joe are 14, Sky and Dorothy are 12, Violet is 11, and Hazel is 8. Mercades graduated from ISBVI last May and she is living on her own. Dean, Rain, Frank, and Joe are all attending Scecina Memorial High School. Sky, Dot, Violet, and Hazel all attend Little Flower.

I have been a member of Little Flower since 2001. Dean, Frank, Joe and Dot were all baptized at Little Flower as infants. Mercades became Catholic and was baptized in 2017. Ryan became Catholic and joined the church in 2018. Rain, Sky, Violet, and Hazel were all baptized at Little Flower in 2018 as well.

LFGN: What do you do for a living and what are your volunteer activities?

DCF: Ryan is a performer and educator with Silly Safaris. He loves working with people and sharing his knowledge of animals with them! He is also a substitute teacher at Little Flower and Scecina, and he is the Scoutmaster at the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired (ISBVI). Ryan is also a very talented artist.

I am a social worker for Catholic Charities and I work at St. Philip Neri School. I am the Cubmaster at ISBVI, and a part time student in the Masters of Theology program at Saint Meinrad. I am also the director of a wonderful summer youth service program, Lawrence Youth Corps, that operates out of Lawrence United Methodist Church.

As far as volunteering, I am a lector and a Christopher minister. Ryan, Dean and I are Eucharistic ministers. Dean, Rain, Frank, Joe, Sky, and Dot are altar servers. We are all adorers in the chapel. Ryan and I have been coaches for kickball and basketball. Ryan and I are on the RCIA team. Our whole family is involved in working the Summerfest, as Ryan and I are in charge of the Kids Games area. We love to participate in parish activities when we can, and we have been leaders for the ChristLife program and other programs. We volunteer for 40 Days for Life on Saturday mornings as peaceful, prayerful protesters during their campaigns throughout the year. We are Church Cleaners as well.

LFGN: What do you enjoy doing in your spare time?

DCF: Ha-ha! We're busy! We are always looking for fun family activities. We enjoy being outdoors...walking, hiking, riding bikes, rollerblading, playing football, frisbee, basketball, swimming and having bonfires in our backyard. All of the kids are very creative and there are always a lot of painting, drawing, Lego, PlayDoh, clay, slime, and cooking projects going on. Many of us love to read and visit the library, and video games are popular with the boys when they're available. We are avid game players and have quite a collection of board games.

LFGN: In what activities are you and your kids involved at Little Flower and Scecina?

DCF: We are involved in many ministries, as mentioned above. The kids are also involved in sports. This year we are in basketball, volleyball, cheerleading, and kickball. The girls are involved in choir and the school play. We have some in Dungeons and Dragons club at LF and some in the Gaming Club and the Chess Club at Scecina.

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MEET THE DAVIS/CHEEVER FAMILY

LFGN: How would you describe Little Flower Parish and tell us what your faith means to you.

DCF: We love Little Flower! It is definitely our church home. It has always been a welcoming, peaceful, and joyful place for us. Our faith is our foundation. Christ has to be at the center of everything...our marriage, our parenting, our home. It does not always come easy. We are so busy all the time, we often have to re-center and refocus. Our faith is a source of both comfort and joy. We are working very hard to make sure that our kids have that foundation as well. We want them to know that God is always there for them and their faith and the church is something they can always lean on.

LFGN: Would you like to share a favorite Scripture?

DCF: I hate to pick favorites of anything because I feel like they always change based on my mood! At this moment, the first thing that came to my mind was Philippians 4:13: I have the strength for everything through him who empowers me.

Ryan's favorite verse is 1 Corinthians 13:13: So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love. Another special verse for us as a couple is 1 Corinthians, verses 4-8 [Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, it is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails.]. Verse 8, Love never fails, is our favorite. We have used this verse as an anchor and a tool throughout our relationship, even when we were just friends, to counsel and comfort each other as we went through various trials. We then used it as a reading in our wedding.

LFGN: Is there anything funny/touching/ we should know about you and your family?

DCF: We are strong believers in watching and listening for God's Will in our lives and trusting in God's timing. Over and over God has shown us that He is trustworthy and always with us.

Beautiful examples of that are intertwined in our weddings. As soon as we got together in 2017, we knew we wanted to get married. We had been friends for so long, and we believed that our friendship was a strong foundation for our marriage and instant family. We desperately wanted to be married in the church, but because we had both been married before, we needed to go through the annulment process which takes 18 months or longer. Ryan has Multiple Sclerosis and takes daily medication. We felt that we needed to marry quickly so that he could be covered by my insurance. We initiated the annulment process immediately, consulted Father Bob, and prayed about the situation. We felt very strongly that being together was the right thing to do and that our marriage cases would be granted annulments. We stepped out in faith and planned a small ceremony for a May wedding on the circle downtown, with just our children and our witnesses. After days of rain, the day of our wedding was idyllic! It was the most breathtakingly beautiful day! The sun was shining and the sky was a beautiful blue! It felt like a miracle! We couldn't have asked for a more perfect wedding day! Our perfect day also turned out to be National Comic Book Day, so we marched our little wedding party down to the comic book store! It was such a crazy fun thing and the kids still talk about it to this day!

Although that was such a joyful day, we were still praying that we would be able to be married in the church. The waiting was agonizing at times, and worrying about what we would do if for some reason we weren't granted permission to marry. We focused on giving it to God and trusting in Him. In the midst of our waiting, COVID happened. More waiting and praying and trying to decide what to do...Ryan was given permission to marry first, but we continued to wait, praying that mine would come through as well. FINALLY, in 2020, we were both officially free to marry in the church and we started serious planning! What a relief and a blessing! Despite COVID restrictions, we got married at Little Flower in February 2021, surrounded by our children and close family and friends. It was another absolutely perfect day! All of our children were in the wedding and close friends participated in the mass. We have an amazing picture taken from the choir loft that shows all of us together with Father on the altar (and Tom at the piano!). It's beautiful and makes me tear up every time I see it. We are so incredibly thankful to God as we look back on our relationship. Where we could NEVER have seen His plan for us, it was always there. Our family is a lot. We are often a spectacle as we come and go. We struggle and we persevere, but one thing we know is that we are so very blessed and God led us to each other!

GABRIEL PROJECT SERVING THE MOST VULNERABLE


